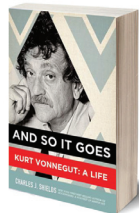

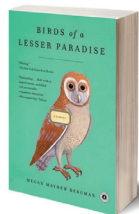
Kurt Vonnegut: A Life, by Charles J. Shields

Birds of a Lesser Paradise

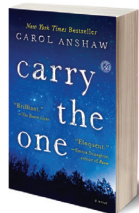
Stories, by Megan Mayhew Bergman

Carry the One

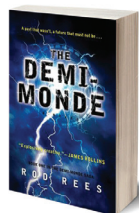
A Novel, by Carol Anshaw

The Healing

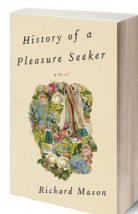
A Novel, by Jonathan Odell

Holy Ghost Girl

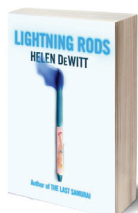
How a Few Simple Lessons Transformed A Memoir, by Donna M. Johnson
